

blink and the world changes. While you looked the other way the trees popped out little leaves or the grass turned green or tulips shot out of the ground. But you and I both know that none of these things really happened in an instant. The leaves happened because a seed was planted 5 or even 20 years ago ... the tulips couldn't have happened unless the bulb lay dormant over the winter .... The grass turned green because it was planted and nourished long ago (the exception to that is quack grass ... but that is a topic for another day).

The affirmation of baptism we will celebrate with 4 youth on May 20<sup>th</sup> happens because of promises made a number of years ago and because of the nurture of that faith by many people over the ensuing years. And this

fruition many years down the road.

The white bag that I use to assist me with the children's time has a picture on it of an overflowing baptismal font and the words, "Baptism is a journey of faith." I think "journey" is good way to understand Christian discipleship as an ongoing process. On our journey following Jesus there are moments of clarity that break in - sudden moments when faith is so real and brilliant. But those moments are possible because of the seeds of faith that were planted earlier in the journey. Planted and nourished along the way.

The life experiences that teach us along the way are sometimes difficult and sometimes mundane, but they make the moments of sudden insight possible. However difficult or mundane those experiences may be they do not take away the wonder - the grace - of sudden moments of clarity.

It is a moment of grace to see a field of crocuses in bloom .... It is a moment of grace to -- all of a sudden -- have a moment of clarity in our faith ... a moment of complete belief ... a moment of knowing that, "Yes, this is why I am here on this planet, This is what God created me for."

May you experience both the nurture and wonder of faith this Spring.

Physiotherapists are primary health care professionals with a significant role in health promotion and treatment of injury and disease. Their clinical skills assess, diagnose and treat symptoms of illness, injury or disability. There are over 20,000 registered

physiotherapists in Canada, who work in settings such as:

**Home-based Physiotherapy:** Over 75% of people requiring home care are seniors who require assistance in managing physical and cognitive limitations. Physiotherapy provided in the home lowers mortality rates related to falls, reduces nursing home admissions and hospitalizations, and decreases hospital length of stay.

**Cardiovascular Rehabilitation:** 90% of Canadians have at least one risk factor for heart disease. Physiotherapy is integral to effective multi-disciplinary cardiovascular rehabilitation.

**Chronic Disease:** 50% of all Canadians are living with at least one chronic health condition. As part of the health care team, physio manages and prevents future health problems.

**Chronic Lung Disease:** One in four individuals will be diagnosed with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). Exercise and physical activity training, by a physiotherapist, is an essential component of programs for improving functional performance and quality of life.

**Emergency Department:** Physiotherapists play an integral role in the assessment, diagnosis, triage and management of patients with musculoskeletal injuries and frail elderly patients who show a decline in function. Physiotherapists facilitate safe discharge planning from the ED.

**Falls:** In Canada, the average cost per fall requiring hospitalization is approaching \$30,000, thus a significant economic burden highlights the need for increased falls prevention programs.

**Intensive Care Unit:** ICU physio treatment is focused on early mobilization of critically ill patients and respiratory management of patients who are ventilator dependent, which improves patient quality of care.

**Joint Arthroplasty:** Physio has an important role in the perioperative management of total knee and hip arthroplasty both pre and post operatively.

**Low Back Pain:** Physio is effective in reducing both acute and chronic pain while significantly limiting the risk of increased disability and chronic conditions.

**Musculoskeletal:** Physio allows individuals - post injury, to return to a healthy living style, including return to work and recreational activities.

**Pediatrics:** Its long term benefits are significant and include reducing disability and the need for surgery or costly invasive interventions resulting in a decreased burden on future use of health care services.

**Primary Health Care:** Physio maximizes mobility in response to the needs of patients across the lifespan.

**Stroke:** 50,000 Canadians have a stroke each year; 75% of those surviving are left with some level of disability. Physio is an integral part of the rehabilitation treatment plan, which addresses physical function issues and prevention of subsequent strokes, which are key determinants of quality of life.

**Impact on Health Care Costs:** Home-based physiotherapy programs are highly cost-effective, reduce hospital long term stay and prevent hospitalization. These services reduce health care costs by keeping people independent in their homes, preventing falls and providing a safe environment within the home.

Indigenous peoples in Canada face unique health challenges and have poorer health outcomes than non-Indigenous persons. Well-documented health and socioeconomic inequities are the result of the long term impact of colonization. Although First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples are on average younger than the general population, there is a higher prevalence of injury, illness and chronic disease. Physio is committed to enhancing physiotherapy access for Indigenous peoples.




## Augustana's Policy Regarding Designated Offerings:

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## Church Council Notes

### Bryan Tastad—Council Secretary

#### From the Council Meeting of April 18, 2018

- Council extends its thanks to:
    0. all those who helped with the Easter Sunday breakfast;
    1. Austen Smith who has been appointed to council fill the year remaining on the term of Jim Sharp;
    2. Margareth Peterson who will join Ron Belke as one of our two lay delegates to the ELCIC Sask Synod convention in Regina in June.
  - General and special offerings to March 31, 2018 were \$45,856 and expenses were \$50,161, resulting in a fund decrease for the first three months of the year of \$4,305. There was a deficit of \$8,634 on general funds and a surplus of \$4,329 on special funds. Please remember our need for general operating funds when making your offerings.
  - Council learned that new shingles are urgently needed on the north facing slope of the church building. They will cost about \$10,300 to install. Your support for this project is encouraged.
  - With the target for the Wheelchair Lift Fund now essentially achieved, the name of that fund will be changed to Property Improvement Fund. This is how you may designate your offerings for shingle replacement or other needed property improvements.





## AUGUSTANA'S HISTORY

First, once again, an apology for an error - thanks to the auto-correct on my computer Baglo became bagel - sorry about that! That prompts me however to remind you of the books in our church library that may be of interest to you regarding the history of the Augustana Lutheran Church (Synod) - the one by Ferdy Baglo is currently on loan, I know - by the way that copy was the personal gift to Nels Yalte from Ferdy Baglo. I once roomed with Ferdy during a conference for all the synodical newsletter editors of the Lutheran Church in America (LCA). So many of the church leaders of our Lutheran Church in Western Canada came from the Augustana Synod - Don Sjoberg and Otto Olson, Ferdy Baglo and Alf Sander, to name only those few.

Another contribution of the Augustana Synod to North American church life has been its musical heritage. The music of the 2nd Setting of the Service Book and Hymnal was composed by Regina Fryxell, who lived in Rock Island, Illinois, and with whom I was friends (so to speak, especially through one of her sons with whom I performed on stage); on Easter Sunday we sang "Christ Has Arisen, Alleluia" (Hymn #364 in our current hymnal) translated from Swahili by Howard Olson, a long-time Augustana missionary in Tanzania. There are three hymns in our current hymnal by E. E. Ryden, long time editor of The Lutheran Companion (the Augustana Synod monthly news magazine), a son of his was ordained with me in 1959. To pick out only one other, one of the Communion hymns (#462) has words written by Joel Lundeen, who was from a long time well-known family of Augustana; his mother, I know, was the daughter of the first pastor of my home congregation. Joel served as the archivist for the LCA during the first decade or so of that church body. And so the list could go on!

Now, continuing the story of Augustana's earliest day from the memoirs of Dr. Anton Nelson: "The completion of the church building program was delayed because when the basement was completed, we dropped

into the great depression in Canada and the United States, which resulted in unemployment and shortage of funds. Many of our members were on relief. A donation of \$1.00 to the building fund was gratefully accepted and equivalent to a donation of \$25.00 today (being 1984) for such a project. Much labor was donated by members. Others worked for 10 cents or 15 cents an hour. The Superintendent, Mr. Axel Nicholson, a member of the Church Council, was paid 35 cents an hour.

"The interior of the church 60 feet by 28 feet" was beautifully plastered with acoustic plastering by an expert plastering crew during the winter months for \$100 in labor costs. The company accepted the job in preference to being unemployed and walking the city streets. Thus, with much determination and sacrifice, the edifice was finally ready for dedication in the early spring of 1936 in conjunction with the Twenty-third Canada Convention to which the Augustana congregation was host."

At this point Dr. Nelson shifts gears, as it were, and begins to talk of how in 1933 he helped organize the congregation in Regina, which became Central Lutheran Church. He also goes on to detail involvement with a group of immigrants during 1929 and 1930 called the "Svenskbybo people" who came from Ukraine but who had Swedish ancestry. Finally, Dr. Nelson wrote: "Hence a "Swedish Lutheran Emigration Aid Society" was formed. Thus, he writes: "As Canada Conference President, I fell heir to the Presidency of this newly born Aid Association. As a result, I was honoured to become the employee of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company at a salary, according to my recollections, of \$1.00 per month plus a pass on all Canadian Pacific road throughout Canada." He then went on to point out that this pass greatly aided him in the extension of his work throughout western Canada in establishing new Augustana missions. When I read of these exploits, I realize how much these pioneering pastors did in comparison to any of us since WW2.

We will continue with more of Dr. Nelson's story next month.
