Parish Nurse Notes October Health Awareness Vitamin Info



Winter is coming, and along with this season, comes enclosed spaces and a heightened exposure to viruses and germs. Let's talk about vitamins and minerals and what they do for the body. They are considered essential nutrients—because acting together, they perform hundreds of roles in the body. They help enhance bones, heal wounds, and strengthen your immune system. They also convert food into energy, and repair cellular damage. Target all the colorful fruits and veggies!

Vit A: Enhances eye health, general growth and development, including healthy teeth and skin. Natural sources are: Carrots and other orange foods including sweet potato and cantaloupe, melons – all of which get their hue from the carotene pigment.

Vit B: (thiamine, riboflavin, niacin, pantothenic acid, biotin, vitamin B-6, vitamin B-12 and folate). Vit B is likely one of the most important vitamins needed. Good for metabolism, energy production, immune function, the central nervous system, formation of red blood cells and iron absorption. Sources: This crucial group of nutrients can be found in whole unprocessed foods, specifically whole grains, potatoes, bananas, lentils, chili peppers, beans, yeast and molasses.

Vit C: Strengthens blood vessels and gives skin its elasticity, anti-oxidant function and iron absorption. Sources: Oranges, guava, red and green peppers, kiwi, grapefruits, strawberries, brussels sprouts and cantaloupe.

Vit D: Gives us strong healthy bones. Sources: Sunlight, eggs, fish and mushrooms.

Vit E: Beneficial for blood circulation, and free radical protection. Sources: Almonds, other nuts, sunflower seeds and tomatoes.

Vit K: Good for blood coagulation. Sources: Leafy greens such kale, spinach, brussels sprouts, broccoli.

Folic Acid: Beneficial for cell renewal and prevents birth defects in pregnancy. Sources: dark leafy greens, asparagus, broccoli, citrus fruits, beans, peas, lentils, seeds, nuts, cauliflower, beets and corn.

Calcium: Good for teeth and bone health. Sources: yogurt, cheese and milk, along with tofu and black molasses.

Iron: Builds muscles and maintains healthy blood. Source: Clams, oysters and organ meats like liver. For the vegetarians among us, soybeans, cereal, pumpkin seeds, beans, lentils and spinach.

Zinc: Beneficial for immunity, growth and fertility. Seafoods such as oysters, spinach, cashews, beans and dark chocolate (YEH!!)

Chromium: Important for glucose function – making sure every cell in your body gets energy as and when needed. Sources: whole grains, fresh vegetables and herbs.



Prayer Changes Things





From the Council Meeting of September 19, 2018

- · Council extends its thanks to:
 - Those who helped with the Broadway Street Fair booth.
 - D.-Jay Krozser for leading the ushering.
 - Staff members for their fine work throughout the year.
- General and special offerings to August 31, 2018 were \$131,023 and expenses were \$159,536, resulting in a fund decrease for the first eight months of the year of \$28,513. There was a deficit of \$34,778 on general funds and a surplus of \$6,265 on special funds. Please remember our need for general operating funds when making your offerings.
- Please sign up to have your photo taken for the new church directory. Photo sessions will be held October 2, 3, 4 and
 19.
- The seven ELCIC congregations in Saskatoon are forming a joint committee to discuss ways to coordinate our shared
 mission in the city. Augustana can appoint one or two members to serve on this committee. If you are interested in being
 our representative, please contact Council President Pat Blakley.
- Sunday School is one of our most important missions. We are looking for ideas on how to spread responsibility for Sunday School among more people. If you have thoughts on this, please share them with Pastor Marilyn.
- On Sunday, July 29, members of the Alhamad family came to Augustana to ask for help in sponsoring other family members to come to Saskatoon. The Alhamads are refugees from Syria who came to Saskatoon under government sponsorship in 2016. Another daughter, her husband and their child, remain in Lebanon. A little over \$20,000 in donations or pledges will be needed to sponsor these family members. Council decided to support the Alhamads by inviting the refugee support group Nest to canvas Augustana members for financial and other forms of support. Council also formed a committee to coordinate our activities with the Alhamads and Nest. 



We are reading and discussing Rosemary RadfordRuether's book. My Quests for Hope and Meaning, an Autobiography. Walking our Faith: A Liturgy of Procession

In this Retreat, our goal is to open our hearts and minds to hear and respond to selected scripture from the Bible that can assist us as Christian women in deepening our relationship and communication with God the Father, His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, and Holy Spirit. The communication processes and selected activities used by our Leader can be employed successfully by members of other faiths with other sources of holy texts to discern spiritual direction and to form caring communities that are faith-based. For this reason, all women interested in the process of spiritual discernment are welcome to attend this Retreat.

Friday night will be a welcoming session and the first step toward building a sense of community. Saturday will be spent moving through a series of prepared settings that will facilitate participants' discernment of God's will in their lives and further development of a supporting community.



Graham MacDonald of MCC, who spoke at Augustana on July 15, notes:

Good morning! Thank you so much for the warm welcome you've shown me today. My name is Graham MacDonald, and I'm the material resource coordinator for Mennonite Central Committee Saskatchewan. Today, we're going to talk about soap, so buckle up! But before we get to soap, Let me tell you a bit about who MCC is, we are a non-profit organization supported by various anabaptist churches across North America. Now I may be preaching to the choir here, but one of the things that I think is special about MCC is that it is a place where very diverse anabaptist groups can come together for a common cause. For anabaptists, this is no small thing, since over our 500 years of history we love us a good schism. We'll schism for just about any reason, including, but not limited to, the type of fasteners we use on our clothing, and which type of horse drawn vehicle is the most plain(no joke!). However, we all seem to agree that, on the whole, the work MCC does is important and needed in our broken world.

Because we are an extension of the anabaptist church, our areas of focus are a bit different from other relief organizations. Our tagline - Relief, Development and Peace in the name of Christ sums up what we do rather nicely. However, something that is left out of this tagline is how MCC runs our programs. MCC works almost exclusively in partnership with other organizations, typically local churches who understand community needs better than we could as an outside organization. We also partner with organizations such as Canadian Foodgrains Bank, where we work closely with other christian organizations (Such as CLWR) to reduce world hunger.

So, now that you know who we are and what we do, let's get back to soap! Maybe I've just drunk the international development kool-aid, but from what I've seen of MCC's international work, soap is something that I think a lot of us take for granted. However, in the context of disaster relief, soap becomes a literal life saving item. In Haiti, MCC has experimented with pre-positioning emergency relief supplies close to vulnerable areas, and has put a lot of effort into developing good sanitation infrastructure. As you may be aware, Haiti has been subjected to 3 natural disasters in the last 8 years, and with this has also come a cholera epidemic. In Kabay, Haiti, a community of about 1200 people, MCC has worked with local leaders and community members to build 181 latrines, and as a result we have seen the number of cases of Cholera and other diarrheal diseases drop from between 15-25 each rainy season to 0.

Thanks to Augustana & Community recycle, whose tireless efforts to collect, clean, and repurpose soap and sheets from local hotels, Already this year MCC has been able to send and additional \$5000 worth of hygiene supplies overseas to places such as Halti, Bosnia, Jordan, and North Korea. This also represents 725 KG of material that was diverted from our landfill! While this may only represent a small percentage of our total humanitarian aid, because of the fact that we have so much extra soap in our warehouse, we are able to send it by the carton, instead of incorporating it into our Relief Kits, which in addition to soap have other supplies such as towels, toothbrushes, and combs and nail clippers. This is important, because our relief kits, as the name implies, are meant for very short term emergency relief. However, we're finding that many displaced people struggle to access good hygiene supplies well after the month that our relief kits are designed to last, and since soap is one of the most important consumable supplies in a relief kit, it makes sense to be able to send more soap than other reusable hygiene supplies such as towels and combs.

So, all this to say, when I learned that we would have a surplus of soap to send to our partners who were requesting it, I was absolutely thrilled that we would be able to fulfill the requests. Even though soap cartons represent only a small piece of our humanitarian aid program, I believe that it is a critical piece of our response, as it is very literally life saving. I am immensely grateful to this community for your participation in the work we do to bring relief and dignity to some of the most vulnerable people on this planet.

Last fall, I had an opportunity to tour some of the projects MCC supports in Jordan & the West Bank. Shortly after I got back, a good friend of mine toured many of the same places, but with Canadian Lutheran World Relief. After he got back, I realised just how much overlap there had been between our tours. Often, we would have the same photos of the same places, and so even though we had toured many of the same places, we came away with some different conclusions.

For example, one of the things that struck me about the refugee crisis in the middle east was that most refugees don't live in refugee camps, but rather most refugees in Jordan live in urban centres. However, my friend had spent much of his time touring CLWR projects in the Za'atari refugee camp, and so while I came away with my preconceived notions of what a refugee crisis looks like challenged, my friend better understood the plight of refugees in camps (even if that doesn't represent what every refugee experiences). It was fascinating to compare experiences, and I couldn't help but think that we were both enriched for having seen different facets of the refugee crisis happening in Jordan.

What this hammered home for me was the need for cooperation in our shared international work, as many of the problems we face cannot be solved by any one organization. We can send whole containers of soap overseas, but ultimately there is a need for more permanent solutions, and we will not get there without working together. I also think, in an age of polarized opinions and extremist politics entering mainstream dialogue, the need for cooperation, and communication with those outside our bubble becomes not only critical for efficient work, but just the act of stepping outside our bubble becomes peacebuilding work.

One of the ways that both MCC and CLWR do this is manifested in our offices in Jerusalem. Jerusalem, as we've seen in the news recently, can be an incredibly polarizing topic of discussion. Now I don't particularly want to dive into this subject, but I was pleased to see that MCC has its offices on the campus of a CLWR supported hospital, and so we are very literal neighbours, both in the biblical sense, but also the physical sense. So even as Jerusalem continues to be a source of conflict for so many, I'm encouraged in knowing that we will continue to work side by side with our larger church family.

So, let's circle back to MCC's tagline: Relief, Development and Peace in the name of Christ and see how intertwined the work of CLWR and MCC is. We work together here in Saskatoon to provide relief supplies with soap and bed sheets, we do development work together through CFGB, and truly believe we build peace when we work together both here at home collecting soap, and internationally like I witnessed in the Holy Land. And we do all of this in the name of Christ. This last part is worth noting, as this is perhaps the most significant thing that separates us from other secular international aid agencies. Because we are motivated by our faith in Christ, not only do we understand the importance of our work differently, but we have more tools to respond, because we can offer prayers and support in addition to the multitude of tangible responses we offer.

One of the favourite parts of my job is when our warehouse is full, and we have a truck on its way to pick up all of the blankets, soap, towels, sheets, school supplies, and other humanitarian aid items we ship. When we get the call that the truck is on its way, our whole office stops what we're doing and pile into the very full warehouse to pray together before shipping the contents of our warehouse off to distant lands. This is for me a powerful reminder that all of the seemingly inconsequential tasks that occupy my (mondays) are only one step in a much larger chain of events that I believe will one day restore right relationships within our human family across the globe. I am always struck by how many people it takes for our work to happen. From our regular volunteers who I see every week to the neighbour who begrudging lends us his forklift when it's time to load the truck, I am constantly reminded that this work requires the combined efforts of more people than I will ever know. So thank you, for supporting us in our work, and I hope we can be supportive of your efforts. May God bless you, and the work that you support, wherever that may be.







October 2018 AUGUSTANA'S HISTORY

This month's instalment on our history will be the years of the ministry of Pastor Del Christianson (he came to be known as "Pastor Del" which is just as well - I find that our 2014 directory spelled his name Christianson but the Augustana Annual of the Augustana Synod spelled it Christensen, as I did at the end of last month's article). I will include also other events and persons from that era as well as they had their impact on our congregation's life.

As noted last month, Pastor Del came to Augustana from having served (his first parish) Messiah, Assiniboia. The 60's still had the upsweep of the post-war years with church attendance and memberships everywhere growing throughout North America, and certainly that was true for Augustana - under Pastor Del's ministry Augustana flourished in ways in which it had not in its first three decades. One might even refer to that period as Augustana's golden years. Many of our current members joined Augustana in that period of time.

Not only would those be years of growth in membership but also will be remembered for the time when Augustana rebuilt its church building. Taking the old building down and utilizing its basement and the tower addition of the early 60's, our current building was constructed. Many members helped with various aspects of that construction. To be noted, the altar which had been located at the east end of the building was now placed at the west end, the choir area formerly located along side of the chancel was now in the balcony, and while the main entrance still was from Broadway Avenue no longer did it take you directly into the nave of the church but into the entrance area so that you would enter the nave from east. Larger entrance areas were obviously more conductive to our Canadian winters - if you ever attend a church where you enter directly into the nave from outside, in winter you will realize what a cold blast of air you probably receive with every person who enters the church.

Pastor Del's winsome ways were an attraction, and during his lengthy ministry he became known throughout Saskatoon resulting in people coming to Augustana for pastoral acts (weddings, funerals, baptisms) and in many cases becoming members of the congregation.

But, those years saw some important changes too. In 1962 the Augustana Synod (church body) merged with three other Lutheran church bodies to form the Lutheran Church in America (LCA). In Canada, there were three synods, Eastern, Central, and Western, the three were combined in a rather loose manner into what was known as the LCA-CANADA SECTION. That merger meant changes. The closer connection that this congregation had with other Augustana (Swedish) congregations in the province gradually became less apparent. Otto Olson was elected the president of the Central Canada Synod, and thus he and his family moved from Saskatoon to Winnipeg where that synod office would he located. While the Augustana professor at the Seminary, by this time it was Harold Florin who had succeeded Otto Olson in that capacity when the Augustana Canada Conference presidency became full-time, continued in that position and he and his wife were members of our congregation. However, now having merged with the former United Lutheran Church in America, other faculty members and students from the seminary were free to be a part of this congregation. During this first decade we mention especially Walter Freitag in this capacity as he had his wife, Meta, and family became a part of this congregation. Now our congregation had two faculty members, or in a sense, having lost the Olsons during this transition, we had gained the Freitags as well as the Florins. The structure of the synod enabled our congregation to provide leadership - many members served the synod or the Saskatchewan District in various capacities. When I came to Central, Regina, in 1969, as I recall, Pastor Del was Dean of our District, and a few years later he and I both served on the Synod Executive Board at the same time. A bit later Art Wacker was also on the Synod Executive Board.

However, those years also saw some other changes. In 1968, the house next door (1209 Broadway) was purchased (not as a parsonage as many seem to think but as a view for future expansion or even a parking lot). Fifty years later we still own it and it is a rental property. In 1969 the congregation in Meecham, Saskatchewan (St. Peter's), an old Augustana congregation, dissolved and all its members became members of our congregation. Some of those people are still part of Augustana today. Having had my brother-in-law, Walter Goos and his wife, visiting this past weekend, I was reminded of how our congregation related to the Lutheran Campus Ministry (Walter was during much of the 60's the Lutheran Campus Chaplain here in Saskatoon). Thus, a rock/folk service was held at Augustana, and although Walter and Marion were a bit fuzzy on the details, I think it is safe to say this service (or services) was held on Sunday evenings at our church in the late 60's (how often or how many they didn't remember). We might say that was an early foray of our congregation into some alternate worship experiences and different kinds of music. Pastor Del resigned as pastor in 1974, having served Augustana for just under 12 years, to take a position as a

Obviously I may have omitted somethings some of you may have thought important. If so, let me know - they can be mentioned in future months. As we progress through the last 44 years (which is about half of the congregation's life), many of you, like myself, have had personal involvement. I would appreciate any suggestions you might have for what could be included in the years of the ministries of Pastor Ted Chell, myself, Pastor Tim Posyluzny, Pastor David Hunter, and our current pastor, Marilyn Fowlie-Neufeld. 
